What is the intended benefit of the rule?

The chapter describes the Department's interpretation of the underlying statute to help the public understand requirements for remote and marketplace sellers. These rules reduce uncertainty about who owes lowa sales tax.

The Department has determined that the rules aid the public in better understanding the collection obligations of remote and marketplace sellers and the limitations of exemptions. The evidence for the benefit of the rules is demonstrated from the text of the rules themselves and the greater certainty they provide taxpayers.
